NOTES FROM BEYOND THE PEWS

Thoughts from Pastor Paul

Dear Siblings in Christ,

Hope and pray you all are doing well, are staying safe and are feeling blessed and that 2024 is treating you well thus far.

Wanted to talk this week about our last Sailboat Church class. It was all about our boat, also known as the church. Joan Gray reminds us that the church is more than a building. It's even more than just a group of people getting together once a week. She reminds us that the church is called to be the body of Christ. And as Christ is both fully human and fully divine, Gray writes, "The church, as Christ's body, also is both divine and human. As a divine, God-ordained movement, it is holy because it is created and powered by God. Jesus Christ promises to make himself known in the world through the church. God, not human beings, created the church. Because of this, the church is more than an organization of people who enjoy getting together to do religious exercises and good works. The church is a divine, even supernatural, community gathered by God to do God's work."¹ God created the church to continue the work of Jesus, to share God's love, grace and mercy and to the world of man that was, and is, broken by sin. As Gray stated, "In his suffering-servant death on the cross, Jesus gave birth to the church. He is the captain of our Sailboat. His cross is its mast. He calls believers to live as sailors, setting sail by the Spirit and navigating in the flow of God's will. But even if the sails are raised and the sailors are ready, a Sailboat has to have wind in order to sail."² And it is the Holy Spirit that was breathed into the disciples that fills our raised sails, moving us closer to God's kin-dom, helping us to do God's work throughout creation.

Gray reminds us that the early church didn't always get it correct. But, when they allowed the Holy Spirit to move them forward, they were able to do wonderful things throughout God's creation. As Gray reminds us, "The Advocate that Jesus had promised did for them what they could not do for themselves and, before long, blew them out of Jerusalem to change the world forever. And they did it, not with their own wealth, wisdom, and power but through participating with the Holy Spirit in Jesus' resurrection life and power."³3 When we follow the Holy Spirit, we do things, not for our own personal gain, but for the mission work that God calls us to. If we are there for our own causes, if we are not out in our communities working to make God's creation a better place, then it is as if we are not even out on the water, but rather still tied up at the dock. This is counter to what God calls the church to do. These are neither rowboat nor sailboat churches; instead, they are more like pleasure barge churches serving their own purpose instead of God's.

And while the pleasure barge churches are still tied to the docks, there are other churches that understand that God requires them to get out on the water and do God's work. The problem with many churches is that they do so with little prayer, discernment, listening for the Spirit, or dependence on God to direct and provide. These are the rowboat churches. As Gray stated, "...without centering their efforts in these God-honoring practices, rowboat churches come up with projects that seem good to them and carry them out with the resources at their disposal. They settle for what they can do in their own power. These efforts at mission may seem successful on the surface. However, because they do not involve a partnership with God, they bear little lasting fruit for God's reign in the world. As Jesus said, "Without me, you can do nothing" (John 15:5)."" As a church, we must seek to always do God's work, and we must also not forget that God, the Holy Trinity, must drive all we do.

So, if you are wondering what a church is supposed to do with the power of the Holy Spirit in its sails, well, that's chapter 5 after the Congregational Meeting on January 21.

I am so thankful for each of you. Please take care of yourselves and be kind to those around you, and yes, that includes yourself. If you'd like to hear from me, please give me or the church office a call and let me

Buildings & Grounds

- Repairs and maintenance of church buildings.

 - Attend to and maintain all FPC Astoria's financial bookkeeping requirements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and related laws.
 - Send out letters with giving amounts to those who have contributed to the church family's finances.
 - o Create and implement annual stewardship campaigns.
- Worship
 - Continually review weekly worship and recommend changes based on comments from the congregation or from personal experiences.
 - o Identify and help plan special worship opportunities throughout the liturgical year.
 - When needed, assist in filling the pulpit through obtaining pulpit supply.
- Personnel
 - Meet with the employees of FPC Astoria on a regular basis.
 - Ascertain the needs of the employees.
 - Give employee reviews at least annually.

Are we a rowboat church or a sailboat church?

Rowboat churches depend largely on human effort. When church budgets shrink and membership declines, rowboat churches frantically row harder against a current, often frustrated and disappointed at their efforts. Sailboat churches, on the other hand, take up the oars, hoist sails, and rely on the Holy Spirit to guide them.

Arguing that churches should be "sailboats," Joan S. Gray encourages readers to shift concern from the many daily, practical concerns of their local church to fresh ideas that can be found using the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The book includes forty days of sailing prayers, quotes from Scripture, brief reflection questions, and an extensive bibliography that is arranged by theme. Perfect for groups to read together, this book will help leaders reframe their church's mission and practice with the Holy Spirit as their guide.




