Lent Explained (BOCW, p 233)

"Lent" comes from an old English word for springtime, perhaps connected with the lengthening of days in this time of the year in



the Northern Hemisphere. The season of Lent is a time for growth in faith— through prayer, spiritual discipline, and self-examination in preparation for the commemoration of the dying and rising of the Lord Jesus Christ. In ancient Christian practice, Lent was a time of preparation for the celebration of Baptism at Easter. In many churches, it remains a time to equip and nurture candidates for Baptism or confirmation, and for the whole community of faith to reflect deeply on the theme of baptismal discipleship. Reconciliation is a key theme in the season of Lent—reconciliation with God and with one another through the grace of Jesus Christ. Lent is a period of forty days—like the flood of Genesis, Moses' sojourn at Sinai, Elijah's journey to Mount Horeb, Jonah's call of repentance to Nineveh, and Jesus' time of testing in the wilderness. The Sundays in Lent are not counted among the forty days, as every Lord's Day is a celebration of Christ's resurrection. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and concludes at sunset on Holy Saturday, at the start of the Great Vigil of Easter.

NOTES FROM BEYOND THE PEWS

Thoughts from Pastor Paul

Dear Siblings in Christ,

Hope and pray you all are doing well, are staying safe and are feeling blessed.

This last week we went over Chapter 6, The Making of Sailors, of the Sailboat Church. This chapter spoke of the importance of sailors in a church family, willing to lay down the preverbal oars and trust in the Holy Spirit to fill the sails.

Gray then explains what makes a sailor in the church family. She begins with the need to trust Jesus. Gray points out that Jesus is often not the reason people go to church. Gray wrote, "People join or remain in churches for many reasons. For example, there are social reasons: "It's where my friends are." Sometimes people want to be part of a group doing good things in the community. Others were born into the church and continue out of habit or duty. Still others involve the family in church because they want their children to have a moral compass. None of these reasons are bad, but they are not what the church is really about. The core purpose of the church is to partner with the Holy Trinity in the salvation and recreation of the world. Christian sailors are people who intentionally commit to this mission and put themselves under the authority of the Lord and head of the church, Jesus Christ."1 To do this, we must have an active relationship with the Holy Trinity, trusting in the life and teachings of Jesus, and what he has done and continues to do for us.

The next thing that makes a sailor, according to Gray, is becoming a disciple. A disciple is a student and follower. As Gray wrote, "No one can be an effective sailor without first being a disciple of Jesus Christ. Intellectual agreement with a set of truths about Jesus is not discipleship. Discipleship is about identity with him and commitment to his way of life." (p42) In making this commitment, as Christ's sailors, we live out the love of Christ following the examples that Jesus gave us in his own life while remaining completely dependent on God to move us forward, guiding us in all our actions.

Another mark of one of Christ's sailors is being filled with the Holy Spirit. "When the Spirit fills us, we are possessed by God and full of God. So instead of saying "she or he has the Spirit," we should really say "The Spirit has him or her!" And this possession or filling is not a one-time thing." (p 44) And as the Holy Spirit fills our sails and moves our boat/church forward, so too does the Holy Spirit fill each of us, moving us forward and guiding us through each moment of every day.

The final part of being a sailor of Christ that Gray wrote about was putting on the whole armor of God. Each piece of God's armor has a specific task to help protect us from being torn apart by the trials and tribulations we will face in day-to-day living.

Gray suggests that we view the armor of God as spiritual practices that protect us as we seek to resist that which is not of God. The first practice is to keep focused totally on Jesus in every aspect of our lives. The second practice is to make sure we are practicing right living. As Gray wrote, "People should be able to see the light of Christ shine through our presence and our behavior every day." (p 46)

The third practice Gray wrote about was practicing faith. Faith is keeping focus on God no matter how bad things seem to be. Gray uses the example of the Apostle Paul and Silas, who were stripped, beaten and put in prison after doing God's work. Gray wrote, "Rather than bemoaning their fate or railing against the injustice of their arrest, the story says that at midnight they were praying and singing hymns to God (Acts 16:16–40). That is faith in action!" (p. 47)

The fourth practice is to remember that we have a God who saves us. Remember this helps to save us from two kinds of despair. The personal despair about ourselves and those we love and the despair about our world. We must remember that God's never-ending love and grace is meant for

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all, and that God is in the process of saving the world and that we are called to be part of God's work.


The fifth and final practice is looking to the power of God's word for our lives and mission. We must do more than read scripture, we must let scripture work on and in us so that we can truly be shaped into the people God calls us to be. We must look at scripture, with the guidance of the Holy Trinity, remembering that it must be taken as a whole with God's love as the foundation.

The next class is on February 18 when we will sail into Chapter 7, **From Rowboat to Sailboat: Raising the Sails**. If you've not been able to join the book study, but feel called to, you are always more than welcome to join. If, for whatever reason you can't join, I still urge you to read this powerful and amazing book. God is calling all of us to raise the sails and let the Holy Spirit move us forward.





Help is a Little Closer for Those in Need of Affordable Housing

County pledges help for affordable housing project in Astoria¹

A \$125,000 promise to Copeland Commons

An Astoria affordable housing project is one step closer to fruition after a pledge from Clatsop County. At a meeting on Wednesday night, county commissioners approved a \$125,000 pledge for Copeland Commons. The money — which comes out of the county's share of American Rescue Plan Act funds — will be made available once the project has been approved by the Oregon Housing and Community Services Department.

In 2019, members of Astoria's First Presbyterian Church purchased the Old State Hotel on Marine Drive. Since then, the group has formed a nonprofit



with the vision of bringing more than 60 units of studio, one- and two-bedroom apartments to the building. The group is partnered with Innovative Housing Inc., the nonprofit developer that renovated the former Waldorf Hotel next to City Hall into the Merwyn Apartments. Copeland Commons, an affordable housing project, is planned for a former hotel building on Marine Drive.

Bill Van Nostran, the former pastor of First Presbyterian Church and the registered agent for Copeland Commons, said the county funding will play an important role in closing a \$1.5 million funding gap. "It just is all coming together," he said. "This is the closest we've ever been to making application to OHCS."

After entering a contract with Copeland Commons, Innovative Housing identified an estimated \$1.5 million budget shortfall and asked the nonprofit's board to raise that amount before submitting an application to the state. Last year, they missed the deadline — but this spring, Van Nostran is hopeful they'll have the funding in hand.

In addition to the \$125,000 pledge from the county, Copeland Commons has also received a \$500,000 pledge from Columbia Pacific Coordinated Care Organization and additional support from the county through a brownfield grant program. They've also raised about \$25,000 locally and have been promised \$300,000 from a local nonprofit, Van Nostran said.

In past years, the Oregon Housing and Community Services Department reviewed applications through a competitive scoring system. This year, all applications will be reviewed.


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"IHI took a look at the whole thing and the new decision-making procedure, and said, 'Boy, if the local board could raise a million and a half dollars, we would really feel confident going in,in April in the 2024 round," Van Nostran said.

Van Nostran said Copeland Commons has already received bids from multiple contractors. Assuming the project is approved this funding cycle, he added, they could get authority to access federal housing funding as early as July. To him, the county's pledge is one step in Copeland Commons' long journey toward making the affordable housing project a reality.

"This is a culmination of six hard years of work," Van Nostran said.
