

NOTES FROM BEYOND THE PEWS

Thoughts from Pastor Paul

Dear Siblings in Christ,

Hope and pray you all are doing well, are staying safe and are feeling blessed.

Well, we were back in the Sailboat Church this last Sunday looking at chapter 8, Moving with the Wind. As with all the other chapters thus far in Joan Gray's book, this one was packed full of information that helped stimulate good thought and discussion. In this chapter Gray talked about the need to be responsive to the Holy Spirit in a manner that best serves God's mission.

The first thing that Gray wrote about was the need to be intentional about spiritual formation as a church community. As Gray wrote, "People who come to church brimming over with God-life have something to share that gives energy to the whole body. However, the disciplines of individuals are not what have the most impact on the life of a church. Rather it is the disciplines engaged in as a congregation that are most powerful. These practices allow the Spirit to move each church into the adventure that God has for it." (p 65) Gray suggests that our church family prayerfully discern areas that need attention, and that we ask God that we be guided to the resources that are needed. Gray suggests that we ask and seek the Holy Spirit's guidance in answering the following:

How in our life together do we make time for people to experience God in ways that empower them? How do we challenge and support people to move out of their comfort zones to serve God? *How* deeply is prayer woven into the fabric of our communal life? *How* can we make the practice of prayer more central? How does our congregational culture encourage generosity, including tithing, as a spiritual discipline? What is the passion level of our worship? **Does** our worship encourage people to offer themselves to God every week? **Does** our worship provide opportunities for people to experience what is being preached and taught? Is testimony from members of the congregation a regular part of our worship? Where in our congregation do people get beyond surface relationships to share their struggles and know one another deeply? What signs do we see of maturing fruit of the Spirit in our people? Where do we need more? How do we as a congregation practice genuine hospitality to strangers and "the least of these"? How do we confront behaviors that are hurtful to the body of Christ? How do we help people change these behaviors? What opportunities do we offer for people not only to learn the Scriptures but also to be transformed by them? What things do we as a congregation need to stop doing so that we can focus more energy in growing toward God and doing God's mission in the world? How could our board, working with the minister, become a more effective spiritual leadership team? How do we hold our leaders accountable and support them in their spiritual growth? Where in our congregation do we practice Jesus' command to "love one another as I have loved you" (John 15:12)? How do we encourage people to share with people outside the congregation how God has made a difference in their lives?" (pp. 66-67)

It is critical that we ask these questions and seek guidance from the Holy Spirit so our church family can be more responsive to the Spirit.

Gray then writes about practicing sanctified imagination. As Gray wrote, "Each congregation must discover its own mission; each one must discern what is beside its name on God's to-do list." (p. 67) Congregations must use their Holy Spirit-led imaginations to find their call. When doing this, we need to remember that what the Holy Spirit is calling us to do might not make sense to conventional wisdom. That might be why Gray uses the word 'imagination'. Before we do this, we must first seek to understand what it means to be Jesus' disciple. That's when you will know in your heart when you hear God's calling.

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The next section, Rise above Self-Interest for the Good of the Church reminds us that we need to be willing to sacrifice our personal desires for the sake of the God's called mission for the church. This is a difficult one for most of us to live up to because it is often about giving up things that seem special for us as individuals. Gray wrote, "This way of moving with the wind involves humility of spirit. It requires that we realize that because something is right for us does not mean it is right for everyone; because we prefer doing things a certain way does not mean that is always the best way to do them. It involves the ability to stand back and look at the big picture when making decisions instead of always doing what we would prefer. Sometimes it may mean sacrificing our own personal desires and interests so that the mission of the church may go forward. Sailboat Christians are willing to rise above self-interest and personal preference for the greater good of the whole. In so doing, they follow the example of Jesus who came, not to be served, but to serve." (p. 70)

Gray then wrote about the willingness to fail. If we are going to be willing to take chances with change, we must also be willing to risk failure. Gray reminds us that many churches wither and die

Gray reminds us that many churches wither and die because they are too afraid of trying and failing. Sailboat churches are, "...willing to risk what God has given for the sake of doing God's will. The risks may involve the church's finances, the church's buildings, or even the church's reputation in the community." (p. 72)

In the section titled, "Cultivate a Culture of Abundance and Generosity", Gray reminds us that when we become overly concerned with scarcity, which usually happens regarding money, we are actually practicing what is known as 'functional atheism'. In other words, we don't trust God to see us through. If we allow the Holy Spirit to truly work, and if we work with the Holy Spirit, we can find the culture of scarcity turned into a culture of abundance.

In her next section of chapter 8, Gray wrote of the importance of discerning and using the spiritual gifts of the church family members. Rowboat churches tend to look at openings on session and elsewhere in the church as, "How many slots do we have to fill?" This often puts people in the position of doing something they have no gift for. A sailboat church works to understand the God given gifts of its members and seeks to get each involved, "...in ministry that both feeds and challenges them to the end that the mission of the church will go forward and God will be glorified. This is how people find joy in serving God!" (p. 74)

Gray then reminds us of the importance living out the agape love that Jesus commanded us to share with each other. Agape love is a selfless love that has us serving each other because the Holy Spirit calls us to, not because we expect anything in return.


In the final section of chapter 8, Gray shares about growing in hard times. Gray reminds us that God is present and working in and through us even in the most painful of situations. Gray wrote, "Three biblical principles are especially important in giving us a spiritual understanding of difficult situations: (1) God can bring good out of anything; (2) God can use our weaknesses; and (3) God leads, and we follow." (pp. 75-76) As Gray wrote, "The temptation to take the reins out of God's hands and put them into our own is very strong and seems to be part of human nature. Failures can become blessings if they teach us that in everything that goes on in the church and in our individual ministries, God leads, and we are to follow." (pp. 79-80) Failure is sometimes God nudging us to where and who we need to be.





INTERFAITH PRAYER WALK


Good Friday, March 29th, at 3:30 pm

Good Friday Processional: Prayers for the Community Friday, March 29 @ 3:30 P.M.




We meet at 12th and Duane to begin the processional and will end at 11th and Duane at the Garden of the Surging Waves.
