The Common English Bible

In case you've been wondering, the translation that we've been hearing from in worship is the Common English Bible or CEB. The CEB translation is one of the most recent translations and, as Dr. Massingale wrote, "The Common English Bible incorporated 120 translators from 24 denominations to provide an understandable English text. Most modern translations use no more 3 texts.



Translating and comparing from 5 original language texts makes the Common English Bible one of the most academically rigorous English translations to date. More than 700 people were involved in making sure that the text was relevant, readable, and reliable." ¹ In short, this may be the best English translation of scripture that we have available.

NOTES FROM BEYOND THE PEWS

Thoughts from Pastor Paul

Dear Siblings in Christ,

It is my hope and prayer that this week's note finds you well and feeling blessed.

As this Easter season draws to a close, we will soon reenter into what is referred to as Ordinary Time on the liturgical calendar. Ordinary Time encompasses that part of the Christian year that does not fall within the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, or Easter. Ordinary time does not need to be "ordinary," and is not somehow a "break" from the Liturgical Year. As a matter of fact, the color for ordinary time is green to denote growth as we continue to reflect on the teachings, life, death and resurrection of Jesus and continue to grow in our relationships with the Holy Trinity and with our siblings.

Growth, be it spiritual growth or physical growth, is change. If we truly believe, that in Jesus, we have eternal life and yes, there are some people out there who do not pay taxes, so the old saying that the only constants in life are death and taxes doesn't hold true as much as the two constants being change and God. Think about the change that the disciples went through that Pentecost morning some two-thousand years ago. Of course, their change didn't start then, it started when they began to truly follow Jesus. But regardless of when the change first occurred, there is no question that it did indeed occur.

The first disciples were not without their anxiety regarding the changes they were experiencing. They had gone from being students of Jesus, to being the ones charged with carrying forth God's message of love, grace and mercy that is meant for all of God's creation. But as we read in John 14, "He will remind you of all the things I have told you. I'm leaving you well and whole. That's my parting gift to you. Peace. I don't leave you the way you're used to being left—feeling abandoned, bereft. So don't be upset. Don't be distraught." (MSG) And just as Jesus didn't leave the disciples without the tools, resources and skills they needed to carry forth God's message to God's creation, we too are given the same tools, resources and skills to carry forth God's message to God's creation. At the core of these tools, resources and skills is the gift of the Holy Spirit. It is the Holy Spirit that also helps us to meet the challenges of each day, regardless of how big or small those challenges might be. Of these challenges, change seems to always be present. A pastor once told me that, "Change isn't so bad, it's the transition that'll get you every time." Change is neither good nor bad, it is simply change. How we respond to the change determines whether not it is good or bad. When we look to the Holy Trinity for wisdom and guidance and, with a Christ centered heart, mind and spirit, follow God's still speaking voice, we can make the best out of whatever changes or transitions life presents us.

Our church family has seen many changes over the years. People come and go in the life of the church, a pastor retires, and a new one arrives, and each day the world continues to present new challenges. The changes are not done. They will continue, and with the help of the Holy Trinity, we will be able to make the best of each change. And just because it will soon be "Ordinary Time" doesn't mean nothing special is going to occur. We must let God continue to work through us, changing us, molding us and using us to make God's creation a better place for all, throughout time, Ordinary or otherwise. Change allows God's message to reach those who may not have witnessed it firsthand before. Kind of like that first Pentecost morning more than two thousand years ago.


Church Women,

Everywhere we look in our culture you will find plastic. One place where you will not find plastic, however, is in the Bible.



Per Capita Payment

As most of us know, pledging is an important part of helping our session to create a budget every year. To know how much we can afford to spend on church activities and mission work, we must have an estimate of how much money will be coming into the church.

Our Presbytery is no different, except that they have a budget that relies on income that is received not from pledges, but rather on a per capita. The per capita is determined by the number of active members of the congregations divided by the budgeted expenses. For this year, the amount of our per capita is \$45.60. The per capita helps our Presbytery to continue its important work of supplying resources and services to each congregation, including ours, as well as doing other missional work in the Presbytery's region.

We are asking that each member please pay their \$45.60 per capita to the church, so that we can pass it on to the Presbytery of the Cascades without pulling money directly from the church's resources.

Held last week, the <u>National Faith + Climate Forum</u>assembled an unprecedented gathering of faith community members committed to build thriving congregations through care for Creation with faithdriven action.

Drawing more than 1,400 registrants nationwide gathered online and in person at 70 locations from California to Maine, this forum, hosted by <u>Blessed Tomorrow</u>, a partner of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), marks a significant milestone in the faith community's response to climate change. This diverse gathering represented more than 20 denominations and faith traditions, each committed to integrating faith-driven environmental stewardship into

The forum provided a platform for national faith leaders to engage in deep discussions and share innovative strategies for building vibrant, resilient communities through care for Creation. Attendees were united by a commitment to addressing climate change and enhancing the vitality of their congregations. The forum highlighted the urgency of our challenges, the vast opportunities for solutions, and how faith communities play a significant role in advancing progress.

Achievements of the National Faith + Climate Forum

• Empowered leaders — Provided clergy and faith leaders with free tools and resources to weave Creation care into their spiritual guidance, preaching, teaching, and pastoral work.

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- Inspired congregations Highlighted effective ways for congregations to engage in Creation care, featuring transformative initiatives like the <u>One Home One Future</u> multi-faith campaign and Blessed Tomorrow's <u>Climate Ambassador</u> training.
- Connected communities The in-person and online formats enabled fruitful connections with local and national faith-based leaders eager to further their climate action efforts.
- Strengthened collaboration Offered dynamic networking sessions to foster shared purpose, a deep sense of unity, and access to grants to further collaboration at the community level and beyond.

The forum's vibrant exchange of ideas and collaborative spirit has laid a solid foundation for ongoing action. Participants were empowered with actionable insights and practical strategies to implement just and equitable solutions in their congregations and at the same time strengthen the social and spiritual fabric of local communities.


