Peace Flag Movement – A Brief History

PEACE

It all began in June of 2016 with a worldwide rise in violence, homicides and another mass shooting; a gay nightclub in Orlando, Florida. Anger, grief, and feelings of helplessness led a small community in Natick, MA to display peace flags as an expression of the need for change —for people to stop killing, come together and care. The story spread as people passing by noticed and wanted to participate. Distribution expanded. Upworthy shared the story. A standing objective was set and remains: anyone who wants a flag can have one. Flags are spiritual Center became the first fiscal sponsor.

Incorporating the input of people from many communities, a flag was designed to better represent the meaning of this symbol. The PEACE flag represents: Every Culture, Race, Spirituality, Gender, Sexuality, Age, and Ability. The new design evolved into a symbol of collective connection, and in the name of racial justice, with new hues and black lettering. NOTES FROM BEYOND THE PEWS

Thoughts from Pastor Paul

Dear Siblings in Christ,

It is my hope and prayer that this week's note finds you well and feeling blessed.

My family and I are just loving it here in Astoria. Regardless of sunshine or rain, or anything in between, it is always beautiful. From the rivers to the trees to the mountains, I always find my heart doing leaps of joy in celebration of what a gift God has given in giving us such a wonderful place to live. And an added bonus are all the wonderful people that make up this area. We all come from different walks of life and may have some differing viewpoints here and there, but together, we add to the beauty of the area.

Another thing that I love about this area is watching the ships cruising up and down the river. I feel like a little kid when I see one and want to do nothing else but watch it sail by. Each morning after I drop off Hazel at work, I look off to the west when crossing the Old Young's Bay Bridge to see if there are any ships in the channel. This morning, I saw one of the massive cruise ships heading into town.

With each ship, whether it is a cruise ship or a cargo ship, I can't help but to think of the many people who are on board from all over God's creation. What experiences they bring, where they come from, what is life like on board, what is life like where they come from, what have they seen on their journeys, what was it like crossing the Columbia Bar, etc...? The Columbia River is somewhat like a superhighway or international airport of rivers, bringing people from all over the world through our corner of it. I've spoken to a few people who have volunteered as cruise ship ambassadors, and they all seem to say how the passengers are so happy and thankful to be greeted by members of the community. Apparently, something that is not present in all ports.

Yes, we need to be careful with 'stranger danger, but we also need to remember that greeting strangers and making them feel welcome, regardless of who they are or where they come from, is something that has always been important in our faith. Scripture calls us to always be there for the travelers, immigrants, be them from another country or another community. In Leviticus 19:34, for example, it is written, "You shall treat the stranger who sojourns with you as the native among you, and you shall love him as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God." (ESV) Another example is Hebrews 13:1-2, where it is written, "Keep on loving one another as brothers and sisters. Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it." (NIV) And as Christians, little Christs, we need to remember to continuously practice hospitality, and that hospitality is an extension of the agape, selfless love that Jesus has for us and that he commands us to have for all others. This is, more often than not, not easy to do. But then again, Jesus warned us that by following him, and living as he calls us to live would be difficult at times. He did however promise us that even though there would be difficult times, if we lived as he called us to, we would realize a deep peace, shalom, that goes beyond understanding or comprehension. We just need to trust in him, grow in him, and allow him to grow in us through prayer and discipline. It's like riding a bike. There can be a lot of scrapes and bruises at first, but after a while it becomes second nature.



Per Capita Payment

As most of us know, pledging is an important part of helping our session to create a budget every year. To know how much we can afford to spend on church activities and mission work, we must have an estimate of how much money will be coming into the church.

Our Presbytery is no different, except that they have a budget that relies on income that is received not from pledges, but rather on a per capita. The per capita is determined by the number of active members of the congregations divided by the budgeted expenses. For this year, the amount of our per capita is \$45.60. The per capita helps our Presbytery to continue its important work of supplying resources and services to each congregation, including ours, as well as doing other missional work in the Presbytery's region.

We are asking that each member please pay their \$45.60 per capita to the church, so that we can pass it on to the Presbytery of the Cascades without pulling money directly from the church's resources.



General Assembly and the shaping of our witness

Next month, we will be gathered again in General Assembly, this time in Salt Lake City, discerning, according to our ecclesiology, the leading of the Spirit for our times as we consider how we organize our life and witness as the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

As part of that, we will consider many overtures (proposals) from presbyteries putting forward issues and concerns that they believe the Church should be speaking out on or acting on today. Much of our work in World Mission is shaped by the decisions General Assembly takes on these overtures.

At the 225th General Assembly in 2022 (General Assemblies are held every two years), the Assembly encouraged us to stand with and advocate for our global partners in situations of conflict; recognized that Palestinians live under a system of apartheid and called upon us "to seek appropriate ways to bring an end to Israeli apartheid"; and made a number of recommendations on our support for the Democratic Republic of Congo, supporting human rights in the Philippines, responding to the human needs of those affected by violence in Cameroon, responding to the situation of depleted uranium in Iraq, ending the siege in Gaza, responding to the needs of the people of Syria, advocating for a Korea Peace Treaty, expanding our engagement with Eastern Europe, promoting peace in Ethiopia and denouncing the Russian military invasion of Ukraine. General Assembly also directed us to explore a "global covenant" to facilitate ecumenical cooperation with global partners who are ministering alongside us in the U.S. with their diaspora communities here, made a number of recommendations on the treatment of refugees and asylum seekers, and called upon us to integrate concerns about and responses to climate change in our global relations.

This is a substantial agenda, which we have faithfully followed and will be reporting on at this Assembly, having woven it into our routine work of journeying with partners across the world, much of which is reflective of these concerns. Listed like this, they remind us how widespread and deep are the troubles of this world, and how we need to be showing up for our neighbors as Matthew 25, in its telling of the judgment of the nations, shows us.

It also speaks eloquently to the theme of this issue of Mission Crossroads. With more justice in this world, we can also discover peace, and with peace we can all flourish.

We are ready to respond as part of our commitment to stand in solidarity with our partners as we journey with them and they with us, and as they share in our concerns about life here in the U.S., which is a whole other story that General Assembly will no doubt also be speaking to.


