# NOTES FROM BEYOND THE PEWS

#### Thoughts from Pastor Paul

Dear Siblings in Christ,

It is my hope and prayer that this week's note finds you well and feeling blessed.

Have you ever found yourself feeling lost? I'm fairly positive that each of us have had one time or another in our lives when we felt like we missed a turn somewhere along the way, either literally or figuratively. It's somewhat funny too, at least from my experience, how the lost feeling isn't one that gradually shows up; instead, it is one that is all of a sudden there. One minute all is okay and the next second...BAMM! What just happened?!?!


Yes, we know God is there for us, but sometimes life can feel so overwhelming that, even with knowing God is there with you, that lost feeling can sometimes blind us from seeing and feeling God's presence. Scripture is full of people who suffered from feeling lost. For example, Isaiah 6:5, where Isaiah says, "Mourn for me; I'm ruined! I'm a man with unclean lips, and I live among a people with unclean lips. Yet I've seen the King, the Lord of heavenly forces!" And sometimes that's what it takes for things to get better. We need to realize that we are lost. And when you're lost in life, who better to ask for directions but God. Think about those wonderful words from Psalm 23, "The Lord is my shepherd, I lack nothing. He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, he refreshes my soul." If we give ourselves to God, if we allow God to guide us through our lost times, although we may still feel a sense of being lost, we can find a peace that is of God. As we read in Psalm 23:4, "Even when the way goes through Death Valley, I'm not afraid when you walk at my side. Your trusty shepherd's crook makes me feel secure."

# Kirkin' O' The Tartan - A Brief History

"On the 25th day of July, 1745, the young Prince Charles Edward Stewart (Bonnie Prince Charles) returned from France and landing at Lochnanaugh began the enlistment of the Highland Clans for his abortive attempt to dethrone George II of England and to restore the Scottish throne to the Royal House of Stewart. After a succession of victorious battles with the English at various locations, vastly outnumbered, exhausted and hungry, the reduced Highland ranks were utterly routed at Culloden on April 16, 1746.

To subdue the spirit of the vanquished Highlanders, the English Parliament at Westminster invoked the Act of Proscription that banned the wearing of any sign of the Tartan, forbad any speaking in Gaelic, outlawed Scottish music, dancing and the playing of the pipes, which the Act said "emitted an aggressive and warlike sound."

It was 36 years before the Act of Proscription was revoked and, during all those years, Highland churches had a special day when the Highlanders gathered, each with a small piece of Tartan concealed under their outer clothing and, with the right hand held over the precious piece, they all joined in the prayer that it might please God speedily to cause the repeal of the devastating Act of Proscription.

When finally the Act was repealed, the Highlanders, as Cunningham in his History of Scotland has written: "returned with joy to their beloved kilt, no longer bound to the unmanly trews of the lowlanders." In 1941, the Rev. Peter Marshall, chaplain of the U.S. Senate and minister of Washington's New York Avenue Presbyterian Church created a special Sunday service to give solace to Scottish-Americans involved in the war and this ceremony of the tartan being blessed in church has been practiced throughout Canada and the United States since that time. Even American astronaut Alan L. Bean took a piece of Armstrong tartan to the moon and back."

#### Per Capita Payment

As most of us know, pledging is an important part of helping our session to create a budget every year. To know how much we can afford to spend on church activities and mission work, we must have an estimate of how much money will be coming into the church.

Our Presbytery is no different, except that they have a budget that relies on income that is received not from pledges, but rather on a per capita. The per capita is determined by the number of active members of the congregations divided by the budgeted expenses. For this year, the amount of our per capita is \$45.60. The per capita helps our Presbytery to continue its important work of supplying resources and services to each congregation, including ours, as well as doing other missional work in the Presbytery's region.

We are asking that each member please pay their \$45.60 per capita to the church, so that we can pass it on to the Presbytery of the Cascades without pulling money directly from the church's resources.

# PC(USA) pastor brings stories from Ukraine to a US audience

LOUISVILLE — In a presentation that featured a Zoom conversation with three people on the ground in Ukraine, the Rev. Dr. Robert Gamble, executive director of <u>This Child Here</u>, spoke on the topic "The Lamentations of Ukraine" with clergy and members of churches in <u>Mid-Kentucky</u> <u>Presbytery</u> last week. Gamble and others illustrated ways that This Child Here, a ministry validated by the <u>Presbytery of Western North Carolina</u>, works with families, mostly women and children,

displaced by the war in Ukraine.

Near the end of Gamble's talk, an app on his smartphone sounded, indicating another Russian drone attack on <u>Izmail</u>, where This Child Here operates in southwest Ukraine near the Black Sea. Among the warnings the app issues during a drone attack: "Overconfidence is your greatest enemy."

After three visits to Ukraine, Gamble established This Child Here in 2006. Eighteen years later, "after working with street kids, working in orphanages, training foster families and teaching peacemaking techniques to teens, Ukraine is at war," he told people gathered for his talk and for lunch at John Knox Presbyterian Church in Louisville, "and we now work with families displaced by this war."

"Everyone I meet has a story of pain, loss and lament,"
Gamble said, citing these passages in the Book of

Lamentations: "How deserted lies the city, once so full of people! How like a widow is she," followed later by, "Young and old lie together in the dust of the streets."

"This is Ukraine," he said, "Bodies in the dust of the streets,"

Gamble said This Child Here "just started with what we knew to be the right thing: meeting families at grocery stores, paying for what they needed, gathering a list of names and faces." Then, "we organized a summer camp at a retreat center near the beaches of Bulgaria. People bonded. We rented buildings and opened centers for sports and creative activity. ... I did not know that so much care could be given without words. I didn't know there is a therapy of belonging, a therapy of place, a therapy of recreation which could also be worded 're-creation,' and a therapy of lament."

Participants heard from three people at This Child Here's facility in Izmail, including Olya Balaban, the ministry's program manager. A <u>recorded clip</u> showed Balaban and Gamble enduring a drone attack together.

"It'll take some victories on the battlefield before Ukraine can prevail," Gamble said of the war now in its 28th month. "Families come to us with their lamentations. Each story I hear is its own howl of pain, often unbearably beautiful in language and honest, brutal in detail. We get the whole searing account of the siege and destruction of Ukraine." Gamble borrowed from the book "A is for Alabaster: 52 Reflections on the Stories of Scriptures," written by his friend, Anna Carter Florence.

Asked how youth served by This Child Here make their plans for the future, Balaban replied, "It's hard to plan even for today. We try to support mothers and children every day" and plan camps "on the sea every summer."

It can be difficult, Balaban said, for staff and others to find out what's going on in other regions of Ukraine. "We get our information from our president [Volodymyr Zelenskyy], from the government and from people who write about it," Balaban said.

Operating This Child Here since the war began with Russia's invasion of Ukraine on Feb. 24, 2022, is "our evidence of grace and power," according to Gamble.

"Surrounding these families and their stories, holding each lightly yet firmly, is a structure I can only define as a healing community of love and trust. It is our life together," Gamble said, quoting Florence's book. "It allows the words to pour out without bleeding out."


