NOTES FROM BEYOND THE PEWS

Thoughts from Pastor Paul

Dear Siblings in Christ,

Hope and pray this note finds you well and feeling blessed.

There is little doubt that we are blessed to live in such a beautiful place. Even though I have not traveled anywhere near as much as so many others, the different places I have been to seem to have their own unique beauty. For example, I've always loved traveling through the Columbia River Gorge from one end to the other. On the west end of the gorge, the sheer cliffs with the many waterfalls, together with the magnificent Columbia River are quite breath-taking. As you head east, along the mighty Columbia, those sheer cliffs begin to give way to rolling hills that go on as far as the eye can see. Although the eastern end is a great contrast to the western end, it still takes my breath away with its own beauty. In short, God's creation is a true gift to all that should be cherished and enjoyed with the reverence it deserves.

It's sad though that, for many centuries, instead of taking care of this wonderous gift from God, so many have abused it for their own gain and/or lack of concern. Genesis 1:28, God tells Adam and Eve, "Prosper! Reproduce! Fill Earth! Take charge! Be responsible for fish in the sea and birds in the air, for every living thing that moves on the face of Earth." (MSG) God didn't tell them to exploit creation, God told them, and tells us, to be responsible for it. When my dad handed me the keys to his car, he made me responsible for it. And, if I had treated my dad's car the way we have treated God's creation, my dad would have never let me even see his car again.

God even told Moses on Mt. Sinai, the same place Moses received the ten commandments, "Speak to the People of Israel. Tell them, When you enter the land which I am going to give you, the land will observe a Sabbath to God. Sow your fields, prune your vineyards, and take in your harvests for six years. But the seventh year the land will take a Sabbath of complete and total rest, a Sabbath to God; you will not sow your fields or prune your vineyards...The land gets a year of complete and total rest." (MSG, Leviticus 25:1-5) But as the corporate world seeks to make better profits than the previous year, allowing land a Sabbath is just not cost effective. So instead of allowing creation to rest and rejuvenate, even though there might be adverse side-effects, chemicals are added to the soil so that it will still produce.

Our denomination, the PCUSA, in 1990 at the 202nd General Assembly, adopted Restoring Creation for Ecology and Justice, which calls our denomination to engage in the tasks of restoring creation. To help our denomination live into this, Earth Care Congregations were established. "Earth Care Congregations are congregations that have committed to the "Earth Care Pledge" and accomplished a specific number of actions toward caring for God's earth in four categories: worship, education, facilities, and outreach." As the Earth Care Congregations guide states, "Our faith urges us to strive for eco-justice: defending and healing creation while working to assure justice for all of creation and the human beings who live in it. This call is rooted in the human vocation of "tilling and keeping" the garden from Genesis 2:15, as well as Christ's charge to work with and for the most vulnerable. Because of their love for Christ who is firstborn of all creation (Colossians 1:15), churches are challenged to live in a manner consistent with God's call to not only care for creation, but commune with creation."

Our session is looking into what it would take to become an Earth Care Congregation, but in the meantime, I encourage each of us to take the steps to act as an Earth Care individual. Making choices that help to support the gift that God has given us in this beautiful, diverse world that is God's creation. Book Study Beginning Sunday, August 18 – The Bible's Yes to Same-Sex Marriage by Mark Achtemeier



What's Happening in Our Session

From Your Clerk of Session

When the session reviewed Pastor Paul's contract, which was up for renewal on July 15 on his one-year anniversary, it was decided to seek to change his contract from a temporary supply pastor to permanent, installed pastor. The following letter was submitted to the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry. The next step will be on November 1st and 2nd in Medford Oregon when the Presbytery votes to approve the new call status, requiring a ¾ vote in the affirmative to pass. At that point there will be a called congregational meeting to vote to approve Pastor Paul as a permanent, installed pastor.

As Clerk of Session for First Presbyterian Church Astoria, Oregon, we would like the Presbytery of the Cascades to grant an exception through G-2.0504c to allow Rev. Paul Davidson, currently serving as Stated Supply, to convert the pastoral relationship to Installed Pastor.

 As required, the session and members of the church met with COM-NW members Jim Wallace and Derek Richman on July 17, 2024, and shared the following reasons and rationale as to why the church believes this is in the best interest of the church, congregation, the mission, ministry and future of First Presbyterian Church, Astoria.

Rationale

- Paul has been with the church just over a year and has demonstrated a passion for the congregation and ministry that is a great fit for First Presbyterian Church, Astoria.
- Paul is very community minded, helping the congregation find ways to share their church with the larger community.
- Session members value his energy and enthusiasm. Though no one can chart the future, church members feel he is the right person to lead the congregation in their setting and these challenging times.
- The congregation loves Paul and his family, even as he has fallen in love with the people of the congregation and community.
- While it would be possible to go year to year with a Stated Supply contract, we believe the Spirit has been at work in bringing us together, and would like to validate that relationship and have the assurance of a strong and stable future by making this an installed position.

Finances

While pledging has fluctuated over the last decade, the session is confident that with the stability of
current membership giving, the steps we are taking to lease or rent space in the building, along with some
investment income held by the church, will be sufficient to meet our financial commitment to Paul going
forward.

Search

- We took the Stated Supply route in calling Rev. Paul Davidson due to the concern that the traditional lengthy search process would be detrimental to the congregation and the stability needed at this time. That concern of finding pastoral leadership, even for a church that has the ability to support an Installed Pastor, is magnified in smaller communities like Astoria.
- It had always been the intent of the congregation to make this an installed position. The process of going from Stated Supply to Installed Pastor had previously worked for the church and the Session understood it to be an acceptable and approved process by Presbytery.
- Because this was a search for a Stated Supply pastor, the church was not able to use the CLC system.
- Therefore, we used every means possible for an open and national search, contacting various presbyteries, seminaries, churches, pastors, 6 months of ads in <u>The Presbyterian Outlook</u>, and our own website.
- This resulted in 5 individuals who expressed interest. Of those who expressed interest, 3 were given consideration. Of those given consideration, 2 pastors (after on-line meet and greets, Zoom interviews, reference checking and watching on-line sermons) were brought in for onsite interviews and to preach at a nearby church. These two individuals included: Pastor Paul and a female clergy person whose current church was being closed. We felt both had strengths and were Spirit led and thought both would be a good fit but felt Pastor Paul "checked more of our boxes" for the present and long term. We made it clear to these individuals that even though the contract was for one year, we were hoping for a longer commitment.

Honestly, we were surprised we didn't receive more applicants. But we believe the Spirit has led Pastor Paul and First Presbyterian Church in Astoria to join together in this relationship to do God's work. We look forward to hearing from Presbytery. If any further information is needed by those involved in the discernment process, please do not hesitate to contact us.

East Texas PC(USA) pastor celebrates Creation during the April 8 solar eclipse

Synod School's closing worship preacher wasn't so sure he'd get to witness the rare cosmic event

STORM LAKE, Iowa — The Rev. Brendan McLean is associate pastor of <u>First Presbyterian Church</u> in Tyler, Texas, one of the communities shrouded in darkness for nearly two minutes during the April 8 solar eclipse.

Only just before it happened, someone forgot to urge the clouds over Tyler to go away.

"I felt like I had a front-row ticket," said McLean, the preacher during closing worship at Synod School on Friday. "But I was watching it from the balcony behind a pillar."

But at 1:43 p.m. Central Time, the sky grew dark like twilight, the clouds parted, "and I could see the total solar eclipse," he said. "How incredible it was to see it with my own two eyes — with solar eclipse glasses on."

For two minutes, McLean and millions of other North Americans "experienced a world fundamentally different than the ordinary world we experience every day, a world where we experienced the shadow of night when we virtually always experience the light of day," he said. "It was other-worldly."

Later, he and his friends shared pictures of what they'd seen via social media. He called the nearly two minutes "unadulterated and unfiltered communion with the cosmos," and he preached Friday using <u>Job 12:7-13</u> as his text.

"This passage from Job tells us the whole of Creation — every part of the universe — calls us to awe and reverence of God."

Job's "beautiful theological statement" is the answer to Job's "friend," Zophar, who's sure Job did something wrong to justify all his suffering. "Job knows this is entirely untrue," McLean pointed out. "Our suffering is not connected to God's retribution."

The wisdom of God is not something we can grasp, "and yet all of Creation — the entirety of the cosmos — has something to tell us about God," McLean said. If we want to encounter God, "all we need to do is simply ask the cosmos, the world around us, at any given time. We are surrounded by

the beauty of Creation that calls to us ... We are made and claimed as God's children and are redeemed and resurrected in Jesus Christ."

"Friends, all of Creation is waiting to tell us something about God," he said. Unlike that solar eclipse, "the window of opportunity to observe something about God is as wide and big as you can imagine — and yet more."

"All we need to do is stay curious and ask, open our ears and our eyes to see that God is good and that Christ died and rose for us, all of us," McLean said. "The God who is more than we can ask or imagine — it is that God who loves you, who cares for you, and who wants you to flourish — not because you've earned anything, but because you are you, and God loves you for it. Amen."

As part of worship, children and youth were given special sunglasses and told, "When you put them on, you can see the kingdom of God." They and all the others in worship were the recipients of a reproduction of a two-sided watercolor signed by most of the 540 people who attended Synod School and bearing this saying: "Remember, God is able to do more than all we ask or even imagine."

Synod School celebrated its 70th anniversary this year. It's put on each summer by the Synod of Lakes and Prairies and held at Buena Vista University in Storm Lake, Iowa. Learn more <u>here</u>.


